### JUROR'S STATEMENT

After two years of darkness and living in a time of not knowing, having the privilege to juror a collection of photographs focused on light reminded me that the world is filled with magic. Light can excite, impassion, impress, generate well-being and create a sense of harmony and wonder with the surrounding environment. I have spent the last week immersed in photographs, revisiting and reconsidering each image. Every submission revealed a particular way of thinking about light, from moody skies, sparkling oceans, to the illuminance of people and places. It was an exciting and daunting process, and, in the end, I selected about three times the amount that could fit into the book. So, thank you for sharing so much excellent work and making my decisions so difficult! It was inspiring to see the range of approaches and the array of imaginative imagery around this subject.

For this effort, I was looking for work where the subject matter was light, not just a photograph with light in it. These selections reflect elements that animate a story or subject, make me reconsider space or move me emotionally. I was also looking for sophisticated images and work that was sometimes unexpected, but was shot with intention and focus. As a juror, I look for unique approaches to a theme, photographs that are not literal or obvious interpretations, and are well-executed and well-considered photographs. I consider the quality of the photograph itself, the quality of expression, and look for deeper meaning or creativity. Finally, I am not only selecting single images, but also curating a group of photographs that needs to feel fresh and have a strong point of view.



Amanda started A Smith Gallery twelve years ago after a thirty-plus year career as a CPA. Photography had been her avocation for the previous twenty years. An opportunity arose to inhabit a space that had been a photography gallery previously in the small, rural community of Johnson City, Texas. The odds of succeeding: small. The desire to do so: large. This is our inaugural, limited edition, fine art photography book representing our call for entry. ALINE SMITHSON is a visual artist, editor, and educator based in Los Angeles, California. She is best known for her conceptual portraiture and a practice that uses humor and pathos to explore the performative potential of photography. Growing up in the shadow of Hollywood, her work is influenced by theelevated unreal. She has exhibited widely, including overforty soloshows at avariety of international institutions, and her work has been featured in publications including The New York Times, The New Yorker, and PDN.

Smithson is the founder and editor-in-chief of Lenscratch, a daily journal on photography. In 2012 she received the "Rising Star" award through the Griffin Museum of Photography for her contributions to the photographic community, and she also received the prestigious "Excellence in Teaching" award from CENTER. In 2014 and 2019 Smithson's work was selected for the Critical Mass Top 50. In 2015 the Magenta Foundation published her first significant monograph, Self & Others: Portrait as Autobiography, and in 2016 the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum commissioned Smithson to create a series of portraits for the upcoming "Faces of Our Planet" exhibition. In 2018 and 2019 her work was exhibited in the National Portrait Gallery in London as part of the Taylor Wessing Prize. Kris Graves Projects published her book LOST II: Los Angeles, and included her work in SOLACE and On Death. Peanut Press released her monograph, Fugue State, in the fall of 2021.

Aline has been a juror for a host of organizations and galleries, and reviewer and educator at photo festivals around the U.S.
