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JUROR'S STATEMENT

"In a portrait, I'm looking for the silence in somebody." - Henri Cartier-Bresson

To make a portrait is an opportunity to pause long enough to see, really see, someone. When I make a portrait I see it as a collaborative act, not so different from a dance. In that dance, the connection between photographer and subject stirs that "silence" on both sides of the lens.

Carl Moore's *Bolivar Square* seemed to anchor a triumvirate with Kevin Lyle's *Troubles My Sleep 20380* in the middle and Jason Blair's *Venetian Man Walking* strolling up behind.

Within these pages you will find portraits that hold that magic. Whether pain or joy or something more mysterious, these pictures speak of finding the silence and elongating a moment of authentic connection. The portraits I have selected range from the distorted abstraction in Cynthia Morgan's *I See You*, *Portrait of Innocence no. 3*, to the vulnerable realness of Whitney Dafoe's *Becoming Wheelchair Bound*. These pictures speak to the depth of human emotion as well as portrayals of beauty defying traditional definitions as in Heather Doughty's *Blow Me a Kiss*. Each portrait reveals a resounding call to show up as our whole selves, in whatever mood or form that may take.

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DIRECTORS' STATEMENT

Portraits, we all have one, whether we like it or not, know it or not. The wonderful exhibition chosen by Elizabeth Flinsch explains this along with the presence of the 27 beautifully posed and creatively conceived images.

A portrait can be a documentary artifact, fixing the subject in time. Many indigenous people refuse to have their pictures taken; afraid the camera will steal their souls. Some of these images prove that it indeed flirts with imaging the soul. However, I'm pretty sure it leaves them home, intact with the owner.

Drawing the figure is still the gold standard in art schools. The human figure is very complex, both alluring and as the mystical idyll of perfection in proportion and form as espoused by Leonardo de Vinci and the Swiss architect, Le Corbusier. The traditional portrait can examine the figure, interpreting it as did the sculptors Michelangelo and Henry Moore.

Contemporary photographers, in many cases, have chosen to approach the portrait, the figure as a main character in a larger tableau, a narrative device that leaves the viewer to conjure the plot. Merete Lien's image "Nataliaqua", recipient of the Director's Award, is a wonderful example of this, as is Sylvie Redmond's Juror's Award image, "Untitled".

Thank you to Elizabeth Flinsch and all who entered for allowing us again to produce a beautiful book of stellar images.
